- Stock market is rising but still no COLA.



LIFE IN THE TIME OF COVID—Kathy Benya

During this time of being homebound, I have become obsessed with learning more about my grandfather, Patrick O'Brien. He was born in Saratoga, New York in 1884. As in most families, there were always conjectures about his life. This winter I was able to determine that he joined the Army in 1914. He was stationed in Vladivostok, Siberia in about 1919 with the American Expeditionary Forces. I never knew that our country was involved at the tail end of the Russian Revolution! His next big adventure was being sent to the territory of Hawaii. Cousin Wendy (not the recipe winner), the family genealogist, actually found the passenger list that proves my grandmother and my young uncle traveled from Port Clinton to San Francisco and boarded an army vessel to join Grandpa in Oahu.

Although there are numerous websites to aid in researching family, many are not free. One of the hidden treasures, though, is the Toledo-Lucas County Library's Local History and Genealogy floor at the main branch. Even during this pandemic, it has been open, plus the resources available online are invaluable. The staff there is knowledgeable and more than willing to help verify, with primary sources, family history especially if relatives are from Northwest Ohio. From phone books to yearbooks to access to a huge newspaper archive, it is all there, and it is free. Go to the Toledo-Lucas County Library website and scroll down under services and you will easily find resources. There is even a workbook to help in getting started on your genealogical journey or perhaps, like me, become more organized.

I find Census reports to be riveting! In fact, I am so grateful for all the family information data discovered, that my husband and I both were Census Enumerators (going door to door attempting to collect information) last year. Start here to begin your search: https://www.archives.gov/research/genealogy/census/about. Records are available up to 1940 but in April of 2022 (hurrah!) the 1950 one is being released. Fun fact: While looking at the 1940 census, it seems my grandmother neglected to place my father on the list of inhabitants in their home. With five boys, I guess my dad got lost in the shuffle.



I know that many of you are far more involved with genealogy than I, but whether it is a fun hobby or an obsession, it is one more way to connect with the past during these unusual times. I would love to have you share genealogical tips and tricks and your interesting finds. Email me at:

ORTA'S STRS FORENSIC AUDIT UPDATE (condensed from ORTA website)

ORTA reached its \$75,000 goal to hire Edward (Ted) Siedle to conduct a forensic audit of STRS. Ted who is with Benchmark Financial Services, is a former Securities and Exchange Commission attorney who received the highest whistle blower award in SEC history. Ted has spent 3 decades forensically auditing more than 1 trillion dollars of pension assets and has won national awards for his work investigating pensions. His book "Who Stole My Pension?" is a bestseller.

Through generous donations from people interested in this pension crisis, the money to secure Mr. Siedle's services was reached in less than 3 months. Listed below is a little information on who donated to this cause:

• 641 ORTA members contributed to the Forensic Audit

- 324 non-ORTA members contributed to the Forensic Audit
- 22 local ORTA chapters contributed to the Forensic Audit with Hamilton Co. RTA contributing a whopping \$15,000! Other chapters stepped up and contributed with Lucas Co. RTA chipping in \$1,000.
- One anonymous donor, not a retired teacher or related to a retired teacher contributed over \$1,200.
 Another active OEA member made a \$500 donation.
- The **Ohio Federation of Teachers** (OFT) made a contribution of \$10,000.
