To us, these signs may bring thoughts of a warm fire, hot chocolate, relaxation and safety. Imagine though, when **victims of domestic violence** first see the "Welcome" sign that **Bethany House** extends to them. This place provides a safe environment where families can feel the comfort of a home free of violence.

The mission of Bethany House is to empower survivors by providing long term apartment style housing for up to one year. They provide access to resources, education and counseling to restore hope with dignity and

respect. To aid in healing, each family receives a warm space that is their own.

At our March luncheon, Deidra Lashley, Executive Director, will relate how Bethany House reduces the feelings of isolation and anxiety, and empowers each family to feel "Welcome." The needs of Bethany House are: **tissues, paper towels, dish soap, room freshener, twin blankets, body wash, body lotion, hair care products, mouthwash and female shaving supplies, as well as gift cards from Kroger, Meijer, and Walmart.**

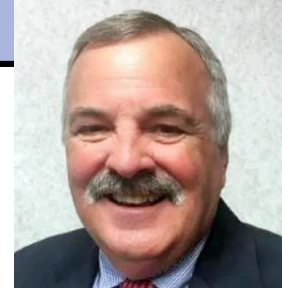

ONE OF NATURE'S BEST OF THE BEST SHOWS IS COMING TO TOLEDO—Jeannine Petcoff

On Monday, April 8, 2024, "Toledoans" will have the rare opportunity of observing one of Mother Nature's greatest events – a **total eclipse of the Sun**. This awe-inspiring event (when the Earth, Moon, and Sun align causing the Moon to block the Sun's light and cast a shadow on earth's surface) will take place at 3:12:17 EDT and will last approximately one minute and fifty-three seconds.

For us, the eclipse will actually begin around 1:56 pm with the gradual darkening of the sky as the Moon begins to cover the Sun's surface. The Moon will completely cover the Sun at 3:12:17 pm when the eclipse will reach its totality or total darkness. For one minute and fifty-three seconds we will safely be able to look directly at the Sun (without any eye protection), see the Corona, possibly a prominence or coronal mass ejection, stars in daytime, natural midday blackness, feel the air temperature drop, hear birds stop chirping, and maybe even witness a touch of nocturnal and non-nocturnal wildlife confusion. At approximately 3:14 pm totality will end and the Moon will begin to



uncover the Sun, allowing the sky to gradually lighten to its fullness once again. Mother Nature and weather permitting, the entire "sky show" will last about two hours and thirty minutes.

A Special Safety Reminder:

- It is **NEVER** safe to look directly at the Sun with the "naked" eye, camera, binoculars, or telescope. To do so can cause permanent eye damage or even blindness.
 - During the pre and post phases of the eclipse (the gradual covering and uncovering of the Sun by the Moon), it is **NOT** safe to look directly at the Sun without specialized eye protection – ISO 12132-2 solar viewing or solar eclipse glasses.
 - Only during totality is it safe to view the Sun directly without specialized eye protection. NASA does **NOT** endorse any brand of ISO 12132-2 solar viewing or eclipse glasses.
- Miss out on the event? **The next Ohio total eclipse is not due until 2099!** Keep your fingers crossed for optimum viewing weather!!!
