LIFE IN LUCAS COUNTY-Kathy Benya

In December, Lucas County Retired Teachers Association members were able to celebrate at the Toledo Club in downtown Toledo. For many of us, it was such a treat to

step back in time and study the beauty of the architecture of one of Toledo's landmarks. This month we are dining at another iconic building, the Toledo Country Club. Believe it or not, these two buildings were constructed about the same time. Both can trace their roots to the end of the

Gilded Age. It was a time of rapid economic growth, and many of the Old West End and River Road mansions were constructed during this time. In fact, as I was researching my family's history, I found that my grandmother, a native of Port Clinton, became a maid (shades of Downton Abbey) at one of these homes during this era.

The venue for our March meeting, the Toledo County Club's clubhouse, was built in 1897.Currently, its members number around 420. Its illustrious history featured club presidents from most of the area's Fortune 500 enterprises. Among these were Robert Stranahan and William Boeshenstein. Once upon a time the building featured a bowling alley and even had accommodations for the employees. But the most amazing feature of the Toledo Country Club is that it regally perches over the Maumee River. In fact, many couples have wed here,



using both the inside and beautifully landscaped outdoors. The main dining room and adjoining River Room can accommodate up to 250 guests, plus there is a deck and patio with plenty of space for outdoor dancing. And, of course, there are twentyfour docks waiting for members to drop anchor in

Golfing at the Toledo Country Club has always been special, thanks to that view of the Maumee River. Originally this was a nine-hole golf course. At the turn of the century, a round of golf could be played for seventy—five cents! Although the eighteen hole course was originally designed by British Open Champion Willie Park, Jr., it has been redesigned by Arthur Hill. It is still considered one of the premier golf courses in the area.

So, once again, dear friends, we are dining in a venue that is very much a treasured piece of Toledo's history. Enjoy!

AEB'S NOT EFFECTIVE IN SERIOUS CRASHES—Jeannine Petcoff



AEB or Automatic Emergency Braking is now standard on • In tests involving T-bone and left most new car models. This newer technology uses forward -facing cameras and sensors to tell a vehicle to apply brakes when a crash is imminent. Over the years it has proven to stem rear-end collisions, injuries, and property damage, but AAA research discovered some disconcerting findings in AEB's ability to stop or even minimize the most serious of crashes.

Between 2016 and 2020, two types of crashes accounted for 40% of all fatalities. These crashes occurred at intersections, involved two vehicles, and were identified as Tbone and left turns in front of an oncoming vehicle. AAA Automatic Emergency Braking research found:

- At 30 miles per hour (mph), AEB prevented a rear-end collision 85% of the time and reduced impact speed by 86%
- But at 40 mph, AEB prevented a rear-end crash 30% of the time and reduced impact speed by 62%.

turn in front of an oncoming ve-

hicle, crashes occurred 100% of the time. The AEB did not alert the driver, slow the vehicle, or avoid the crash. These findings did not support the touted life-saving aspect of AEB technology nor did it meet the consumer's expectation of a system designed to prevent serious crashes.

Technology that offers effective crash and safety protection is still much needed. Automakers and regulatory agencies should be urged to continue to focus on system design and testing protocols to better address these issues. In the meantime, drivers need to recognize the limitations of AEB and other helpful technologies. They also need to remain focused and engaged when behind the wheel since speeding and bad driving behaviors are increasing.
