WHO KNEW?—Jeannine Petcoff

In today's world of lock downs, shelter in place, disrupted supply chains, mask, don't mask, it is sometimes hard to find anything that can make you laugh or even bring a smile to your face. Some say trivia can at least bring a "huh" or maybe, with luck, a quiet chuckle. With that in mind, here is an attempt to brighten your day with that needed chuckle or at least a "huh."

Did you know...

- that if your home address is an odd number, you probably live on the south or east side of the street, but if it's an even number you probably live on the north or west side.
- your mail carrier brings you an average of 41 pounds of junk mail a year of which 44% is never opened & only one fourth is recycled.
- over the past years, & in some instances even today, the United State Postal Service has delivered mail via stagecoach, pneumatic tube, ski, Segway, roller skates, dog sled, snowmobile, train, supersonic jet, biplane, helicopter, boat, ferry, hovercraft, bicycle, horseback, mule, & feet.
- for the average family of four, garbage collectors pick up 6,424 pounds of your trash a year.
- if you were to sort through 50 pounds of waste left after all the conventional recycling materials were removed, you would find 10.5 pounds of food waste, 9 pounds of

plastic, 7.5 pounds of paper and cardboard, 5.5 pounds of rubber, leather, & textiles, 4.5 pounds of metal, 4.5 pounds of yard trimmings, 4 pounds of wood, 2.5 pounds of glass, & 2 pounds of "other stuff."

- grass does look greener on the other side of the fence because you view your neighbor's yard at an angle making it more difficult to see the dirt & bare spots.
- the life cycle of a single blade of grass is three to six weeks thus making this year's lawn not the same as last year's.
- if you could use your x-ray vision you'd find concrete sidewalks are typically 4 inches thick, driveways 6 inches thick, & interstate highways 11 inches thick.



• And finally, the button you push at a crosswalk in a major city does nothing because an operable pedestrian crosswalk signal muddles the flow of traffic.
