LIFE IN LUCAS COUNTY—Kathy Benya

We have visited so many elegant venues for our luncheons in the last year. I do have to admit, though, there is one club that delights from the moment I drive up the boulevard leading to it. The lush golf course and impeccably manicured gardens of Stone Oak Country Club prove to be beautiful all four seasons of the year. Kudos to the landscape architect who manages to make arriving such a wonderful experience for guests.

Once upon a time, though, Stone Oak was not Stone Oak! Originally this was Glengarry Country Club, designed in 1921, by the legendary S.P. Jermain. Nine unique holes formed the course and, slowly but surely, by 1954 Glengarry Club was recognized as having an award winning, challenging 18-hole golf course.

The original clubhouse was on the same site as the club house where you are being served the September luncheon. Unfortunately, in the mid 1980's a horible fire destroyed that building. In 1988, the Club was acquired by Cavalier Properties and in 2001, ownership was transferred to the membership of Stone Oak Country Club, and the clubhouse was rebuilt.

Last May when we dined at Highland Meadows we were honored to be on the course where each summer so many members of the LPGA have vied



for first place. From 1984-1988 that tournament was played at Glengarry. In fact, the first Jamie Farr LPGA Open was held on these very grounds in 1984. Lauri Peterson won \$26,000 that year. This year Linn Grant won the Dana Open LPGA taking home over \$260,000!

So, what does Stone Oak have to offer? You are seated in one of several options for inside and outside dining. There is now the newly constructed Turnberry Tavern (near the recently constructed lift). The 18-hole golf course is considered a championship course. Members can also find practice areas for chipping and putting. The Golf Shop features a golf simulator, great for Ohio rainy days. There is a competition-sized pool, tennis and pickleball courts, plus a fitness center. As you enjoy the view while dining, know that you are enjoying one of the premiere private golf clubs in this area with a rich history.

KEY FOBS & AUTO THEFTS—Jeannine Petcoff

Like the cost of living and all the other increases we have been experiencing, car thefts have also been on the rise. Since 2016, data seems to indicate cars with keyless entry technology (key fobs) have been the most targeted.

A most convenient feature, keyless entry allows one to unlock and start a car without using a cumbersome bunch of keys. It also, however, makes cars more vulnerable to tech-savvy criminals. Working in pairs, a device is used to locate a key fob in your home. Once the signal locks in, it is redirected and transmitted to another person waiting near your car. By amplifying the signal, your car is tricked into thinking your key fob is present and it allows your car to be unlocked, started, and even driven away. Known as "relay attack" the entire process can be accomplished in 20 to 30 seconds.

Targeted cars are mostly high-end luxury vehicles such as Tesla, BMW, and Land Rover, but also targeted are KIA, Hyundai, Honda, Toyota, Subaru, Nissan, Jeep Grand Cherokee, and pickup trucks.

In the Toledo, Ohio area, the most targeted vehicle thefts involve Dodge Chargers, Challengers, Durangos, Jeep Grand Cherokees, Ford Mustangs, and pickups. While no specific auto makers were identified, the

sources referenced stated two manufacturers implemented security fixes on all their vehicles and 14 manufacturers had done nothing at all. If you have concerns, consult your dealership.

On the brighter side, **keyless entry theft can be prevented** fairly simply. Here's what you can do.

- 1. Make sure your car is **completely and properly locked**.
- 2. **Do not leave** anything visible or **valuable in your car**.
- 3. Keep your car in a garage.
- 4. Don't leave the key fob in your car, in a coat pocket, jacket pocket or on a table near your front door, or in easy view on your kitchen table or counter.
- 5. Purchase and **keep your fob** and any spare fobs **in an RFID box** or pouch. The RFID blocks the signal your fob emits.

And last, but not least! If you have one of those "old

fashioned" key fobs where you have to push a button to unlock or start your car, you are NOT at risk of being hacked by "relay attack." Keep Safe!
